

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza Ontario Update

January 9, 2025

On behalf of the Feather Board Command Centre (FBCC), the following provides important updates regarding the highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) situation in Ontario.

THE CURRENT SITUATION

As of January 9, 2025, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) has confirmed the presence of HPAI, subtype H5N1 on seven (7) premises in Ontario in the following regions (click on the location name to access the 10km FBCC buffered biosecurity advisory area):

- IP 50 <u>Strathroy-Caradoc</u>
- IP 51 Oxford County
- IP 52 and IP 53 Oxford County
- IP 54 <u>Town of Strathroy</u>
- IP 55 <u>Oxford County</u>
- IP 56 <u>Middlesex County</u>

Each confirmed infected premise has been placed under quarantine. CFIA has also established specific movement control measures and permitting processes (as outlined below).

Across Canada, there are 74 active cases in Canada. Details can be found <u>here</u>. There have been 113 HPAI detections in poultry flocks in the United States of America. Details can be found <u>here</u>.

FOR FARMERS AND INDUSTRY IN BIOSECURITY ADVISORY AREAS

CRITICAL REMINDER FOR ALL POULTRY FARMERS & INDUSTRY STAKEHOLDERS

FBCC reminds the entire Ontario poultry industry to follow heightened biosecurity measures (found <u>HERE</u>). Farmers are reminded that they should have appropriate biosecurity personal protective equipment (PPE) available for themselves, their employees and anyone entering their premise.
